Regulations for admitting persons to the Freedom of the Borough were first laid down in the reign of Edward III and revised in the reign of Elizabeth I, and again in 1652, 1758,1796, 1807, and 1823. By the time of the Municipal Corporations Reform Act 1835 admission was confined to

- Sons of Freemen, who could be admitted at 16
- Apprentices of Freemen, who could be admitted on the expiry of their Indentures provided they were then 21
- Persons who purchased the Freedom
- Persons to whom the Freedom had been presented.

The Act brought to an end the ability to purchase a Freedom.

The sons and apprentices of Freemen had to pay fines on admittance, whilst the cost of purchase was 'not less than Ten pounds and Ten shillings' in 1796. Freemen were allowed to trade and had common rights on Lancaster Marsh.

Those listed have Levens connections. The Roll shorthand, e.g. Rich or Rich'd for Richard, has been ignored.
